OUR MISSION


The mission of New Trier Township is to provide leadership, advocacy and resources to benefit the physical, mental and social well-being of Township residents.

A MESSAGE FROM THE TOWNSHIP SUPERVISOR



MAKING A DIFFERENCE – 24/7/365

When we pondered the theme for the 2015-16 annual report, your Township leadership team was in the midst of planning our programming and budget for the upcoming fiscal year. The conversation shifted to ways in which New Trier Township could build on what we do well, and

make a distinct difference in the lives of those feeling the strain of losing funding due to the State financial crisis and budget impasse.

Indeed the economy has improved, more people are back to work and consumer confidence is on the rise. However, that is not the case for everyone. We speak with many individuals that have experienced job elimination, and are either unemployed, or working at wage levels far below their previous situation. Other clients are facing serious illness, disability, or the challenges of being elderly with limited means. The demand for “safety net” services that we provide remains steady, with 5,434 individuals being served this past year. Our Food Pantry serves both young and old, people who cannot make ends meet, and those simply in need of a helping hand until they can get back on their feet again.

Other recent developments impacting the Township are the rising level of substance abuse cases and suicide rates amongst teenagers in the North Shore. These alarming statistics were clearly a siren call to your Township Board, who felt compelled to address the challenge head on. We are pleased to announce the New Trier Township Board of Trustees accepted the recommendation from our Mental Health Committee to grant funds launching Text-A-Tip, a


free confidential text messaging system providing round-the-clock access to qualified mental health professionals. These experts will be available to help children in grades 5-12 with instant text message counsel and service referrals in moments of concern or crisis. We selected LEAD (Linking Efforts Against Drugs), a Lake Forest based non-profit organization to manage the program in our Township. LEAD has a proven track record of saving young lives in McHenry and Lake Counties with this wonderful service. You will hear a great deal about this program as we gather data and work with LEAD and our school district partners to develop educational programs that help the youth of New Trier Township navigate their life challenges.

At this writing we are still in the midst of a State budget impasse in Springfield. The media has featured numerous stories stemming from a 2015 report by the Local Government Consolidation Task Force. The Task Force proposes consolidating Townships or transferring their duties to counties or local municipalities. Not only would the costs to consolidate a Township far outweigh the benefits to taxpayers, we would also uproot a proven system that combines the efforts of volunteers, elected officials, local businesses, and neighbors that band together every day to make a difference in the lives of many. I urge you to review the facts and statistics within this report that illustrate how a small portion of your property tax dollars fund programs that strengthen and stabilize our communities.

I am often humbled by the generosity and civic pride we are blessed to experience here on the North Shore. For over 165 years, your Township Government has evolved and developed programs that help agencies improve the quality of life for neighbors in need. I am grateful for the opportunity to work as your Township Supervisor, and pledge that we will continue to challenge ourselves every day to make a difference in the lives of our residents and for the common good of the communities we serve.

A MESSAGE FROM THE TOWNSHIP ASSESSOR



As I reflect on this past year of serving the residents of New Trier Township, I am reminded that your Assessor's Office is the first level of support for questions regarding the Cook County property tax process. The Township Assessor's Office is here to assist residents with tax exemptions, senior deferrals, veterans' exemptions,

assessment grievances, and in securing copies of deeds and tax bills.

Working closely with Deputy Assessor Lois Cross, we fielded 1,965 inquiries from homeowners, potential buyers, realtors, attorneys, appraisers, villages, schools, and park districts.

The number of building permits was 514, down from 657 the previous year. Home sales remained down, although the number of homes listed for sale was very high. Teardowns and new home sales were the predominant transactions. We recorded only 389 sales in 2015, compared to 794 the previous year.

Over the past seven years nearly every homeowner in America has been impacted by the rollercoaster ride of fluctuating home values. We have seen some stabilization of home prices, and values appear to be increasing as employment and consumer confidence levels continue to rise.

Additionally, tax rates increased at a significantly lower pace, 5-7% in 2015, compared to 11-14% in 2014.

It is important for you to know that property owners in Cook County have three forums through which they may appeal their assessments. The first venue where you may file an appeal is the Cook County Assessor's Office. If you do not appeal to the County Assessor, or feel the reduction granted is too small, your second venue of appeal is with the Cook County Board of Review. Finally, if you still feel you haven't received appropriate relief, you may present your case to the Property Tax Appeal Board (PTAB). You must file an appeal with either the Assessor or the Board of Review before going to the Property Tax Appeal Board.

The New Trier Township Assessor's Office handled 273 appeals locally and another 245 at the Board of Review level in 2015. We're hoping to see a more refined version of the review system in 2016, to further assist taxpayers in navigating the triennial reassessment.

A MESSAGE FROM THE TOWNSHIP TRUSTEE



When one assumes the duties of a Township Trustee, you begin to look at our community in a different light. One of the critical issues I've learned a great deal about are the needs of constituents that are single parents, or perhaps couples working several jobs to sustain their families.

Clearly parents want to assure the safety of their children, making certain they are involved in wholesome activities before/after school, and during the summer months. For nearly a decade, the turbulent economy has exacerbated childcare demand, but unfortunately those who need it the most cannot afford it. Your New Trier Township Board of Trustees has studied this issue and made addressing it a priority.

Our Childcare Scholarship Programs were developed to offer support to Township parents through Before/Afterschool, Daycare, and Summer Camp scholarships. In order to be eligible for this support program, all parents and/or guardians, whether a one-or-two-parent household, must be working or enrolled in school.

I am pleased to report that in 2015, 48 children in New Trier Township enjoyed summer camp experiences after receiving scholarships. The median age of those children was 8 years – much too young to experience a summer at home, unsupervised, while other neighborhood children attended camp. Additionally, 17 children received scholarships to participate in before/afterschool programs. As one parent so eloquently stated:

"The funds provided by New Trier Township make a tremendous difference in every aspect of our lives. I am able to be financially responsible, paying all my bills on time, and can afford my child's involvement in programs like Cub Scouts. With the school day ending at 3pm, I had to enroll my child in After School Recreation, so that I can put in a full workday. While totally worth the cost, the program is expensive. Without your scholarship, I am unsure of how I will make it all work. The Scholarship is a saving grace for us".

Helping working parents realize their life goals while providing safe, enriching programs for their children isn't a gift or "handout," this is an initiative that helps solidify our present and future. Community is about shared goals and helping neighbors face the headwinds of these challenging times –with confidence. I am proud to be part of New Trier Township, a place where our staff and partners carry out the credo of improving lives and helping all individuals realize their full potential.

**FEATURED PROGRAM:
COMMUNITY SUPPORT GRANTS FOR
PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES**

The Community Support Grants program was created in 2007 in recognition of the many individuals and families in our community who face weighty expenses related to a disability. Since its inception, the program has seen significant increases in the annual number of applicants. The Township staff attributes that increase to the fact that individuals living with disability have less resources available to provide assistance due to broad cuts in state and private funding. In addition, the Township has successfully amplified efforts to publicize the program thus generating additional awareness resulting in more applications.

The program is unique in that there are no age or income restrictions on these grants, which aim to offset the tremendous financial burden of caring for the needs of a person with disability. Children or adults with a diagnosed disability are qualified to apply. Eligible

conditions including but not limited to autism spectrum disorders; developmental and/or cognitive delay; multiple impairments; mental disorders qualify an individual for grant assistance. Additionally, residents with certain diagnosed compromising physical impairments are also eligible to apply for the Community Support Grants program.

The budget for funding Community Support Grants has been \$175,000 since fiscal year 2013-14. That amount is distributed evenly among recipients up to \$1,500 per applicant. In the first five years, award recipients were selected by lottery and the maximum number of grants awarded was fifty. Since fiscal year 2012-13, all applicants who meet the residency and disability criteria receive a grant. In 2015-16, 188 qualified resident applicants each received \$930 towards covering the costs related to living with disability.

FY2015-16 FUNDED AGENCIES / GRANT AWARDS

Your Township Government works closely with numerous social service agencies throughout the North Shore. Requests for funding are evaluated by Advisory Committees made up of resident volunteers who hold hearings to consider grant requests. Advisory Committees along with their Trustee representative then submit funding recommendations to the Board of Trustees for review and approval before grants are awarded. To be considered eligible for grant awards, an agency must be a non-profit organization that provides direct services to a significant number of Township residents, have a firm sense of mission, have an appropriate infrastructure in place that ensures accountability and performance to its clients and funders and meet one or more of the Township identified priorities including seniors, youth, economically challenged families and persons with disability. This process has proven effective in allowing resident volunteers to responsibly steward the allocation of tax dollars on behalf of their fellow residents in a thoughtful, transparent and accountable fashion.



**NEW TRIER TOWNSHIP
BUDGET & APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE**

ORDINANCE NO. 2015-01

An ordinance appropriating for all town purposes for New Trier Township, Cook County, Illinois, for the fiscal year beginning March 1, 2015 and ending February 29, 2016.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Trustees of New Trier Township, Cook County, Illinois.

SECTION 1: That the amounts hereinafter set forth, or so much thereof as may be authorized by law, and as may be needed or deemed necessary to defray all expenses and liabilities of New Trier Township, be and the same are hereby appropriated for the town purposes of New Trier Township, Cook County, Illinois, as hereinafter specified for the fiscal year beginning March 1, 2015 and ending February 29, 2016.

SECTION 2: That the following budget containing an estimate of revenues and expenditures is hereby adopted for the following funds: General Town, General Assistance.

SECTION 4: That if any section, subdivision, or sentence of this ordinance shall for any reason be held invalid or to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this ordinance.

SECTION 5: That each appropriated fund total shall be divided among the several objects and purposes specified, and in the particular amounts stated for each fund respectively in Section 2, constituting the total appropriations in the amount of Three Million Thirty Seven Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$3,037,870) for the fiscal year beginning March 1, 2015 and ending February 29, 2016.

SECTION 6: That Section 3 shall be and is a summary of the annual Appropriation Ordinance of this Township, passed by the Board of Trustees as required by law and shall be in full force and effect from and after this date.

SECTION 7: That a certified copy of the Budget & Appropriation Ordinance shall be filed with the County Clerk within 30 days after adoption.

ADOPTED this 26th day of May 2015, pursuant to a roll call vote by the Board of Trustees of New Trier Township, Cook County, Illinois.
